Challenges/Opportunities

SADLY, 1:3 women, 1:4 men and 1:3 teens will experience the trauma of domestic violence in their lifetime. As reported by the California Department of Justice, Fresno County has the highest per capita call rates to law enforcement for domestic violence incidences in the state of California. Marjaree Mason Center is Fresno County's only comprehensive domestic violence service agency offering 24/7 crisis response, emergency and longer-term housing, case management, counseling, legal advocacy, children's enrichment, youth prevention/ education and programs for those who have caused harm. In 2021, MMC provided critical and life-saving services to more than 8,000 adults and their children to break the cycle of violence and experience the freedom of life without abuse. Marjaree Mason Center cannot do its work alone. Individuals, businesses and private foundations are active partners with MMC through monetary and in-kind contributions as we work TOGETHER to prevent and end domestic violence in Fresno County.

Goals

THE TIME has come for Marjaree Mason Center to begin a new chapter with a campaign we are calling Courage Takes Root. The Center's current facility is more than a century old and on the National Register of Historic Places. No longer able to serve its purpose, we are hindered by the distance between multiple sites and capacity to provide clients with the privacy and security they deserve. MMC recently purchased property, centrally located near the Blackstone corridor, to build a Community Resource Center and provide other vital services. More than just a building, this opportunity will optimize Marjaree Mason Center's already proven strategies to support more adults and their children, transform more lives and end the cycle of abuse in our community. THE tragic murder of Marjaree Mason in 1978 launched a call to action for programs and services to protect and provide for some of the most vulnerable residents in Fresno County. Protecting children from maltreatment BEFORE it happens requires teaching parents, professionals and all adults what hurts children and what protects them.

For example, of the top 5 risk factors that cause child abuse and neglect, substance abuse has the highest rate involving 85% of all child abuse/ neglect cases.

Building strong families to keep children safe and healthy is possible if our community leaders and partners start investing more in primary prevention efforts to target vulnerable families.

Child abuse can last a lifetime if no cares enough to help.
